News from the Guidance Office December 2024

College Applications

Seniors planning to go to college after high school should be diligently working on applications if they have not yet applied. Regular admission deadlines are early in January so students are encouraged to submit their applications BEFORE winter break. Students should give teachers and counselors at least two weeks to write letters of recommendation. It is important to communicate regularly with your counselor about where you are applying to ensure your transcript gets to the college in time.

Financial Aid

The 2025–26 FAFSA form is now available for all students and contributors! Filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or FAFSA is critical in determining how to pay for college. It allows students to find out which types and how much Federal Student Aid they may qualify for. If students are applying to a New York State school they should also be filing the Tuition Assistance Program or TAP application. Students and guardians should plan to submit the FAFSA and TAP by February 1! Shaunte Middleton from Binghamton University's Education Talent Search will be available to students that need help with this process. How to Apply for Financial Aid:

FAFSA Completion Steps:

- 1. Create a FSA ID at https://studentaid.gov/fsa-id/create-account/launch.
- 2. Complete the FAFSA at https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa.
- 3. Complete the TAP application if attending a NYS school at https://www.hesc.ny.gov/find-aid/nys-grants-scholarships/tuition-assistance-program-tap/.
- 4. Complete the CSS profile, if necessary, at https://cssprofile.collegeboard.org/.

Please reach out to the Counseling Office to set up an appointment with Ms. Middleton if you would like help completing this process.

SAT and ACT

There is still time for college-bound seniors to take the SAT or ACT. While some schools have a test-optional policy, there are schools and programs that require SAT or ACT scores. Both exams have fall test dates!

SV is not a testing site, but our students can test at local high schools in the area such as Binghamton HS, Vestal HS or Maine-Endwell HS.

Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School: Pay Attention to Attendance

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Frequent absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other difficulty.
- . By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- · Missing 10%, or 2 days a month, over the course of the school year, can affect a student's academic success.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Make school attendance a priority

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day.
- Help your children maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- · Try not to schedule dental and non-urgent related medical appointments during the school day.
- Keep your student healthy. If you are concerned about about a contagious illness, call your school or health care provider.
- If your children must stay home because they are sick, make sure they have asked teachers for resources and materials to make up for the missed learning time in the classroom.

Help your teen stay engaged

- . Find out if your children feel engaged by their classes, and feel safe from bullies and other threats.
- Make sure your teens are not missing class because of challenges with behavioral issues or school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, contact the school and work with them to find a solution.
- Monitor you teen's academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors when necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- . Encourage your child to join meaningful after-school activities, including sports and clubs.
- Support your students if you notice signs of anxiety, and if needed, seek advice from your school or health provider

Communicate with the school

- . Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalties.
- . Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not adding up.
- Seek help from school staff, other parents, or community agencies if you need support.

Online Threats & School Safety

Recently, there has been an increase in social media threats impacting schools in the area. It's important to be aware that threats—whether made as jokes. pranks, or more serious actions-carry significant risks and real consequences. Sharing and reposting the threat via social media platforms only spreads misinformation and creates public alarm.



Key Points to Remember:


- Safety First: Our top priority is the safety of all students, staff, and our community.
- Consequences Are Serious: Making or sharing threats can lead to criminal charges, school suspensions, or even expulsion.
- Law enforcement and school districts immediately investigate every reported threat using all available resources.
- It's a Crime: Any threat, whether direct, implied, or shared, is taken seriously and can result in:
 - Arrest and prosecution.
 - Permanent records affecting future opportunities.
 - Disciplinary action according to the district's Code of Conduct

If your child sees or hears something alarming—either online or in person—please encourage them to report it to a trusted adult. school staff, or law enforcement immediately. Early reporting can help keep our schools safe.

How You Can Help

Parents, we need your support:

- Talk to your child about the seriousness of making or sharing threats.
- Monitor social media use and encourage open communication.
- Remind them that reposting or sharing threats also carries consequences.
- Do not repost, share, or promote the threat on social media. Contact school officials or law enforcement.





































REPORT DON'T REPOST



If you see a threat, either posted on social media or in person, <u>REPORT IT</u> to a trusted adult, school official, school resource officer or law enforcement immedately.

RE-POSTING and SHARING a threat on social media is not a notification.
It causes further panic, misinformation and in some cases,
makes the sharer an accessory to the crime of making a threat.

IMPORTANT:

Making a threat against a school generates significant law enforcement and school resources to investigate.

Every threat is fully investigated with all available resources.

Making threats against a school may result in criminal charges and disciplinary action by the school.



To report a threat, contact your local school, school resource officer, local police department or the Broome County Sheriff's Office at 607-778-1191.

- 10. Reading a book is fun!





Are you considering purchasing a musical instrument?

If you are considering purchasing a musical instrument AT ANY LEVEL of your student's musical education, please take a moment to assure a great **investment** for your musical future.

A quality instrument:

- Is made by a company with a long-standing history of quality. Examples of band instruments include, but are not limited to, Yamaha, Conn-Selmer, Bach, Geimenhardt, Fox-Renard, and Buffet. For orchestra, examples include Shen and Eastman. Even certain models from these manufacturers and from certain dates may have known concerns.
- Comes with a warranty. Read the fine print on websites VERY carefully, as many sites include no warranty.
- Is made of materials that meet industry standards. Be particularly aware of lacquer quality.
- Many quality used instruments are available, even at the local level. As students progress and upgrade to intermediate and professional level horns, they will often sell their excellent student models at a great discount! Local stores and private music teachers should be your FIRST stop to find these instruments. If you see one online, check with your teacher FIRST before making an offer.

Be careful of off-brand/colored instruments. Our district's experience shows:

- Repair costs are significantly higher. Repair parts can be difficult to obtain. Many times, the cost of making the instrument playable is more than the purchase price.
- Instruments are often unable to be tuned, increasing frustration for students and making them inappropriate for use in band and orchestra.
- Colored lacquers often chip quickly. Be aware of the current issues in regards to lead paint on imported products.
- Questionable materials may be in the metal. The metal is often weak and bends easily even being damaged as musicians put the instrument together.
- These instruments are often found in store and warehouse catalogs, or on non-music store websites.

Always consult with your student's music teacher about what instrument will best fit their needs, and where to find the instrument. Teachers will also offer their professional guidance regarding instruments that you are considering.

Remember - you get the quality you pay for!







Senior Photos and Grad Ads for the Yearbook

Please be advised of the following important dates regarding your child's senior year deadlines for Yearbook submissions:

Senior Portraits

Schedule your **senior portrait** to ensure proper delivery to the school. Senior portraits are **due Friday, December 6**. Failure to meet this deadline may result in an absence of a senior portrait. Picture days were September 19-20 at the high school. If you were unable to schedule a senior portrait, or attend these days, November 6, (our retake day) is an opportunity to get a senior photo. Seniors need to get their photo taken on these dates to receive an ID card. No costumes or props will be allowed for photos.

Portrait Requirements

Senior Portraits must be submitted electronically (CD, email jpeg, USB). The digital image must be a resolution of 300 dpi and the color mode must be RGB. The image should be sized to a 5x7 image to ensure proper clarity. The yearbook is an all-color book so please plan accordingly when choosing a photo for the yearbook. To maintain a consistent look, only head and shoulders will be in the yearbook photo. No costumes or props will be allowed for photos. Photos submitted should be in color and with a simple background. The SVHS yearbook reserves the right to refuse a photo not meeting specifications.

Senior portraits are due Friday, December 6.

All electronic submissions are to be sent to Mr. Dana Zietz at <u>dzietz@svsabers.org</u>. If submitting in person, please see Mr. Zietz in room 22 in the High School. Any picture received after the due dates listed are not guaranteed to be in the yearbook. It is the student's responsibility to check with their studio to see if the studio has submitted the senior portrait to Susquehanna Valley. Portraits from Sean Murphy Studios will automatically be sent to the school.

For the 2024-2025 school year, our yearbook photo contract is with Sean Murphy Studios. They offer free yearbook sessions in their Binghamton studio for all Susquehanna Valley seniors. Sean Murphy Studios also offers full senior sessions which include the sitting and a selection of prints or digital images starting at only \$100. Many of their senior portrait collections include multi-location sessions with custom photoshop graphics, personal smartphone apps, and some even include 50 free prints!
